Please bring your completed RE TASK FORCE SURVEY to SNUUC this Sunday!

The RE Task Force was created to advise SNUUC's board on several topics as we seek to replace the irreplaceable Susan Nykolak as Director of Religious Education. The survey asks a variety of questions to get a sense of what you are thinking and feeling as we proceed at this important moment in SNUUC's history. The first decision the Board needs to make is whether we will seek an "interim" DRE (someone who would not be eligible to be hired permanently), or an "acting" DRE (someone who is hired for one year but would be eligible to be hired permanently). The advantage of having an "acting" DRE is that if we like the temporary person, we can hire them. The disadvantage comes if we decide that we do not want the temporary person to remain on. It can be uncomfortable, having gotten to know the person all year, to tell them they aren't wanted as the permanent DRE.

Please help to guide the Board's decision-making process on this and other decisions by filling in the survey that was handed out on Easter Sunday (April 8). There are 3 separate surveys; one for adults, one for youth, one for children. If you did not receive a copy of the survey, please contact the office, or any member of the Task Force: Denise Hibbert, Rosemary Olander Beach, Arden Fekett or Tom Weingarten.

Please note that the RE Task Force is a temporary group advising the Board. A search committee has not been formed.

OUR BOARDWALK

Hi everyone. In this time of renewal and rebirth, it is
time for us to renew our financial commitments to
SNUUC. We are now in the midst of our canvass
campaign. As we consider our pledges for this coming
year, we should keep in mind what SNUUC means to
us.

Pledging is not about paying our bills. The bills will get
paid. It is about building a strong foundation to put our
faith into action. Jim and I recently invested a ridiculous
amount of money re-building the foundation of our
home. One interesting revelation afterwards was that,
when the wind blows hard (as it has been more often
than not these days) the house barely shakes, even
though it is 7 feet higher than it used to be. When it was
on the ground - on the old, unsteady foundation - it
swayed with the slightest breeze, it seemed. Even
though we spent so much money, it appears that
strengthening the foundation made the whole house
more stable. It was well worth the investment. Here at
SNUUC we have a unique opportunity to share the
joyful message of Unitarian Universalism. We have a
good foundation already, something many
congregations do not have. But imagine what we can
do with an even stronger one.

Jim and I have decided to increase our pledge by 50 %
this year. The resulting number will be ten times our
first pledge. Our commitment in the beginning was
tentative, and that was reflected in our pledge. As our
commitment grew, so did our pledge. It now represents
almost 3% of our total income. If you do the math, you
will understand how much money that is. Now, I do not
recommend that everyone should pledge this much of
their income. We all have varying levels of commitment
to SNUUC that are comfortable for each of us. But our
foundation will benefit more if we go a little beyond
comfortable. Jim and I have decided to put our money
where our mouths are, where our hearts are, where our
faith is. I ask you all to consider doing the same.

Chalice Lighters

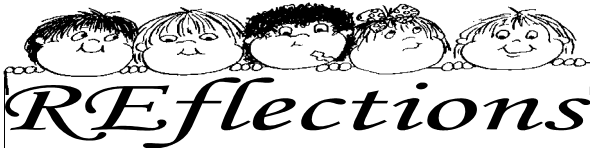
