Community Minister's Corner

Summer 2007

The unofficial start of summer is Memorial Day, a strangely somber inauguration of a season of carefree days spent in the sun. That Monday holiday gives people a nice opportunity to get away for the first of many a long weekend, yet it also reminds all of us to recall those gone from our midst for good.

Next weekend I myself will be out of town, attending my college reunion. Fifteen year ago, I tossed my mortarboard cap in the air, bid a farewell to student life, and stepped out into a summer day that for me marked the much awaited, eagerly anticipated beginning of adult life. Now that I am considerably farther along in that adult life, I wonder what my rush was.

The first time I will be returning to campus as an ordained minister will also be the first time I will be co-officiating at a memorial service. On Sunday morning, an Episcopalian priest and I will lead our fellow members of the Class of '92 in mourning the loss of the 13 members of our class who have died since graduation. Whether their deaths took place years ago or months ago, they all died far too young, which means they all died tragically.

We will grieve those tragedies during a weekend that is otherwise meant to be a series of celebrations. Being thirty-somethings, we alums will trade many stories of job promotions, recent marriages or maybe divorces, the births of children, all the sorts of stories that our 13 classmates by rights ought to be trading with us. And that will alter somewhat how we tell them, I think, and how those stories sound to us.

In summertime, the Gershwin's wrote, "the livin' is easy.... Don't you cry." Living is not always or even often easy—that is exactly what the ease of summer underscores for us. Sometimes, though, it can be. Those easy times are ones we can and should relish, knowing as we do that sadness will someday be standing by.

Between Memorial Day and Labor Day, the relaxed rhythms of summer let us savor moments could have passed without our having tasted them at all. The flavor of life is bittersweet. If we are lucky to live long enough, we tend to acquire a taste for it. This summer, remember to treasure the warmer spells in our time together, because at those clambakes and barbecues, we just might recognize that our deepest hunger is what is being fed.



Hours to help will be Monday evenings from 4:00 - 7:00 and families who can come for 2 - 4 hours once a month are suggested. Children must be old enough and able to work unsupervised.
