Musings from the Minister

Dear friends—

In 1850, Edgar Allen Poe wrote a short story called "A Descent into the Maelstrom," which is the fictional first-person account of a man who lived through a terrifying storm. The turning point of the story is when he realizes that all hope is lost: "It may appear strange," the character says, "but now, when we were in the very jaws of the gulf, I felt more composed than when we were only approaching it. Having made up my mind to hope no more, I got rid of a great deal of that terror which unmanned me at first." No longer focused on getting out of the storm, with a strange calm he begins to observe the manner in which the storm is tossing his ship. While his brother, terrified, clings to the mast, he himself can see clearly that only by jumping ship is it possible to be saved.

While I've never been in quite that harrowing a situation, I have found myself in times when the thing I've been clinging to for dear life turns out to be the very thing I most need to let go of. December can be such a storm of activity or emotion or both—January often feels like the calm after the storm. January may be just the right time of year to slow down and take notice of what we have been clinging to as though our lives depended on it. Maybe our lives depend on letting go instead.

Community Minister's Corner

The poet Ovid was so taken with the month of January that he devoted a poem to cataloguing its highlights. In "Kalends", he writes: "See how Janus appears first in my song to announce a happy year to you..." Months in the Julian calendar were not merely named for gods and emperors, but dedicated to them, as well. In Roman mythology, Janus was the god of gates and doorways, beginnings and endings. He seemed the obvious choice of deities to preside over the month of changing years.

Janus is perhaps most recognizable in profile, as he actually has two faces looking in opposite directions, forward and backward. "Tell me the reason," Ovid muses, "why you alone of all the gods look both as what's behind you and what's in front..." Ovid observes that even the Greeks, whose pantheon the Romans so handily appropriated, had no counterpart to "two-headed Janus, source of the silently gliding year".

We tend not to let the year glide by silently anymore, at least not in New York, where throngs teem into Times Square with noisemakers and loudspeakers blaring. As a New Yorker, I have never so assiduously avoided a place in time as I have New Year's Eve in Time Square. I have not even felt tempted to watch the ball drop in person. Truth be told, I'd rather sit at home and just flip a page in the calendar. What we should probably be marking at day's end on December 31st is the earth's continuing to spin on its axis without our actually turning it.

A brand new year seems to hold out twin possibilities of a clean break and fresh start, a swift and sharp descent into a future disconnected from a past that is presumably altogether too familiar. These shiny possibilities do not bear much resemblance to the virtues of twin Janus, who simultaneously witnesses past, present, and future in his encompassing vision. For his part, he holds steady, posted at "Heaven's Gate with the gentle Hours," those goddesses of time, keeping him company.

Our modern conception of time is not this gentle. If anything, we've gotten contentious about time. We're always racing against the clock in an attempt to beat it. But that doesn't seem a very sporting contest, honestly. What if we regarded time as our friend and not our foe? What if we let it keep us good company? What if we glided happily through the days of our life?

The job of Janus, according to Ovid, is "to send Peace" to the world. He beholds the past with gratitude and the future with equanimity and in doing so remains present to the present. We've moved from the Julian to the Gregorian calendar in recent centuries, but Janus still remains the patron of the first month. Come January, we could all try his kind of multitasking for a change.
