# Community Minister's Corner

Dear friends,

The news these days has been full of videotapes of Barack Obama's pastor, Jeremiah Wright. In these clips from his sermons, Rev. Wright rails against white supremacy and the arrogance of US foreign policy. For many, these statements seem to be racist and anti-American. Others, however, are urging the necessity to look at the statements in a larger context of his whole ministry and of the culture of African American church life. What strikes me is how easy it is to characterize one another unfairly if certain phrases we've used (or portions of conversations we've had) are taken out of context, and then repeated endlessly in order to foster a certain negative opinion of us. I'm not speaking only of ministers, of course, although I have found myself wondering what video clips of me might appear on YouTube if any of you decides to run for president!

How often do we, at cocktail parties and water coolers, do the very thing the media is doing to Rev. Wright: we repeat to one another, "So and so said..." or "I hear so and so did..." The "clip" we repeat is almost always intended to cast the person in a bad light. What is it in us that makes us so eager to label and dismiss one another, to identify an enemy or find nefarious intentions? More importantly, how do we foster in ourselves and in our communities true dialogue and interest in one another's thoughts and feelings?

It isn't always easy to listen to one another. Now that Rev. Wright has been cast in a negative light, anyone hearing him will tend to look for racism and anti-Americanism in everything he says. And what we look for, we are more likely to encounter. What if we were to make an intentional effort to encounter one another afresh each time we met? Not dismissing what we know of the other from the past, but being willing to be pleasantly surprised, being willing to have our hearts softened, being willing to have our relationships transformed?

I think what we'd get is the beloved community we all seek, and the living out of our highest values as UU's.

A few days ago, the vernal equinox passed, marking the start of spring in the Northern Hemisphere, the half of the world where we happen to find ourselves. Yet spring has started only officially. The days are still chilly, the nights chillier; my ears and nose know these to be stark facts. Stubborn winter may try to linger a little while.

This year, as it does most years, March made spring seem like a mere technicality, with the vernal equinox serving as mere promissory note: warmer days to come, blooming flowers to follow. Just trust the spinning earth to bring us round to a gentler season. It's early yet, isn't it?

Briefly, we hang in the balance. The equinox brings us to that precise point where everywhere around the globe, days and nights equal in length. Nobody's brighter time signal anybody else's darker one. The sun rises and sets in equal measure on us all. There may be some comfort to be taken in that alone.

Overlook the cold weather and focus on the singular dimension of human fellowship. Does that warm your heart somewhat? Almost as soon as it is begun, the equinox is over. The balance tips and one hemisphere tilts into light while the other tilts into shade. Spring and fall, these reversals occur. The vernal equinox spins into the autumnal equinox, which then turns us around again.

Such revolutions are the stuff of our topsy-turvy lives, so we are wise to nod to them. It might feel easier to bear up under the harsh elements knowing that someone is having a balmy go of it elsewhere. That axial moment when absolute equality is achieved is necessarily fleeting. More often than not, we must take turns being up and turns being down. We ought to take turns...

This reality is as readily minimized when we're up as it is when we're down. Reconcile yourself to pretty much always going round and round, and you may discover within yourself a newfound patience. At the very least, you may develop some impatience with your impatience. I've learned that I'm usually tickled by this very development in myself, even if my ears and nose aren't.

Come and hear the stories of Long Island immigrant families that have recently experienced midnight raids, incarcerations, deportations and the separation of parents from their children. Learn of their lives and share your own questions, thoughts and perspectives. Come to our program on April 13 and learn more about this important issue and consider what you may do. Authentic Central America food will be available for a small donation.

**Movie Night Saturday, April 26 7pm, Golden Venture** a film that chronicles the ongoing struggles of passengers aboard the Golden Venture, an immigrant smuggling ship that ran aground near NYC in 1993. Passengers had paid at least \$30,000 to be brought to the U.S. from China's Fujian Province, expecting to arrive indebted but unnoticed. But a seemingly golden opportunity quickly evolved into a hellish descent through the cruel whims of U.S. immigration policy.

The Golden Venture crash fed a media circus and became a symbol of a growing national concern over illegal immigration. "Golden Venture" is a global epic, a story of stoic perseverance and unexpected grace, played out in the shadow of national politics and the continuing failure of ever-harsher US immigration policies. At a time when the immigration issue has led to furious debate and high stakes political maneuvering, the fate of the Golden Venture passengers is more relevant than ever.
