Dear friends,

The days of February are both short and long. Short, because the sun sets so early and the cold is so fierce. Long because the sun sets so early and the cold is so fierce! In these cold, dark days, I look to poets such as Langston Hughes to understand how to live richly in times when I feel impoverished.

Langston Hughes' poetry conveys both the profound oppression suffered by the African American and the spiritual strength that triumphs over that oppression.

"Triumph over" is, perhaps, not the right phrase – "triumph through" seems more fitting, for his poetry seems to convey that his people have – in spite of the intent of their oppressors – made spiritual meaning of their suffering. I find great inspiration in knowing that even in suffering much greater than my own, other people have managed to thrive – if not materially, then spiritually.

I end with the poem that first brought him widespread acclaim was *The Negro Speaks of Rivers*:

I've known rivers:

I've known rivers ancient as the world and older than the flow of human blood in human veins.

My soul has grown deep like the rivers.

I bathed in the Euphrates when dawns were young.
I built my hut near the Congo and it lulled me to sleep.
I looked upon the Nile and raised the pyramids above it.
I heard the singing of the Mississippi when Abe Lincoln went down to New Orleans, and I've seen its muddy bosom turn all golden in the sunset.

I've known rivers:

Ancient, dusky rivers.

My soul has grown deep like the rivers.

In the RE Wing

“Let us live the poetry we sing.” These are the words on the gravestone of poet Edwin Markham (1852-1940). Markham is best known to UUs for his poem, “Outwitted,” which circulated widely among Unitarians and Universalists in the 1950s:

*He drew a circle that shut me out—
? Heretic, a rebel, a thing to flout. ?
But Love and I had the wit to win: ?
We drew a circle that took him in!*

I never get tired of the story in this poem! It’s still beloved to many. One young adult UU friend of mine is fond of reciting it for others, as part of his “elevator speech” summing up what thrills him about UUism.

Markham’s idea of Love’s circle is even built into the design of some of our houses of worship. I know of two congregations—one in Schenectady, and one in Baton Rouge—which cite this verse as the inspiration for elements of their architecture.

The message is an enduring one. That great Nazarene, Jesus, preached it 2000 years ago, and a humorous bumper sticker reminds us of it today (*Love your enemies. It really gets them confused!*) At SNUUC, we can help our children develop an expansive concept of **us** that whittles away at an “us versus them” mentality. We can nurture an expansive concept of **family**—yes, we are all brothers and sisters in the human family. We can tell stories and sing songs that affirm the inherent dignity of us all.

Indeed, Love’s circle is built into the very mission of our RE program. And it’s modeled every week by SNUUC’s teacher-volunteers, whose service I’d like to recognize with a valentine.
