OUR BOARDWALK

Spring has sprung, finally it seems, and for me it brings a sense of renewal and purpose -- just the frame of mind for embarking on this year's budgeting process. It is hard upon us, and at our April meeting the Board of Trustees spent much time discussing priorities and the dollars that fund them.

We were happy to receive the Stewardship Committee's canvass news -- financial commitments that are a net increase over last year's. This increasing level of financial stewardship by members is particularly gratifying given the financial difficulties and uncertainties many among us are facing. Clearly, it will take all of us pulling together, sharing our resources, to make sure SNUUC thrives.

The board will be working closely with the Finance Committee in the next few weeks to develop a budget for the 2009-10 fiscal year. Please note the following dates, when the board will present the budget for the congregation's feedback and, finally, vote.

May 3 (noon): The board will present the proposed 2009-10 budget to the congregation for discussion and feedback. (This is also the date by which committees' annual reports are due in the office so they can be ready in time for the May 31 congregational meeting.)

May 31 (noon): The board presents the final 2009-10 budget to the congregation for a vote.

At its last board meeting, trustees also approved a proposal for the formation of a Thrift Shop Visioning Task Force to plan for the future of the Thrift Shop. Recent years have seen a decline in receipts, yet the shop remains a thriving operation that makes a significant contribution to SNUUC. The task force, whose members will comprise Thrift Shop workers, the minister and other congregants, will solicit ideas and information from a wide range of "Thrifties" and congregants in an effort to plan for the Thrift Shop's future - can we "grow it" wildly, will it continue to have solid success, or how will we know if we must plan for its closure? The task force will report to the board as it progresses over the next several months.

Finally, these attendance figures, provided to the board in the Rev. Catherine Torpey's April report, provide an interesting snapshot of Sundays at SNUUC:

March 22: 53 in worship; 94 in the building (Justice Sunday)

March 29: 96 in worship; 104 in the building (Junior Youth Worship)

April 5: 56 in worship; 95 in the building (Passover)

April 12: 117 in worship; 125 in the building (Easter)

“Woyaya” We Got There! A Successful Annual Drive for “This Special Place”

On the first Sunday in March we kicked off the annual campaign for Financial Commitments in worship by singing a lovely song called “Woyaya”. The song communicates how we are going on a journey... we don't quite know how we will get there, but “we know within” that we will get there.

The Stewardship Committee is so happy to report that, indeed, we got there! The annual drive has been a great success. Together we have promised \$124,551 to SNUUC for the coming fiscal year. That represents an increase of \$5,669 over the current commitment base. This is remarkable. Here is a representation of 86 pieces of good news:

And, more good news may yet come. When three more ‘pledging units’ have completed their decision making for ‘09-’10 we expect the finally tally to go up a bit more.

We loved doing ‘stewardship’ with many of you at the “Eat, Be Merry and Commit” meals that were a feature of this year’s campaign. We are particularly grateful to Tom and Rosemary Beach and Joe McAuley for hosting two wonderful dinners.

Thank you, one and all, for giving generously to SNUUC, and for participating whole heartedly in this crucial effort. Collectively, our commitments are the life’s blood of “This Special Place”.

Here are some online resources for your religious exploration at home:

"Between Sundays: Answering Kids' Questions" is a website to help parents and other adults answer children's **religious questions**. You'll find it at clf.uua.org/betweensundays/. Some sample questions: "Do UUs pray?" "Can you believe anything you want to as a UU?" The home page advises, "Don't be concerned about your own level of knowledge....Learn along with your kids, explore religious concepts together—model the 'search for truth and meaning' in an open and loving environment."

"Dictionary of Unitarian and Universalist Biography," at www25.uua.org/uuhs/duub/, is a project of the UU Historical Society; it has over 300 **biographies** so far.

At the "Unitarian Universalist Family Network" site (archive.uua.org/families/index.html), click on the "Family Life Stages" page, and check out "The Un-Class for Unitarian Universalist Parents" for ideas for **activities** and parenting tips.

Finally, here are some possibilities for home rituals your family might find meaningful:

Try this idea for a **bedtime prayer** for parents/guardians and children together.

-- Tonight I am thankful for... (*say some of the good things that happened to you today.*)

-- And I am sorry for... (*what happened today that you feel sorry for doing or saying?*)

-- Tomorrow I intend to... (*what do you intend to do differently, or improve, tomorrow?*)

and/or

-- Tomorrow I hope for... (*things you hope for and how you think you can make them happen.*)

Here is a simple **table grace** to try: "Let us give thanks and be nourished by this meal & this time together. Amen."

At dinner with friends recently, I improvised a table grace using the words from our Sunday morning chalice lighting, and my friends loved it. If your child is already familiar with this one, they might enjoy the chance to lead your family in grace before your meal. Give it a try!
