Muusings from the Minister

Dear friends –

This fall, we were approached by a couple of theological students about the possibility of having them do internships with us here at SNUUC. The fact that I will be on sabbatical during the second half of this year, combined with hesitancy to take more money from our congregation's savings right now, made the executive committee of the board decide that it wasn't good timing for us to take on any interns. However, I hope that in future years, SNUUC will have intern ministers.

Intern ministers are different from community ministers. A community minister is already a minister, not someone in formation. They are affiliated with a congregation, but do their ministry primarily in a context other than the parish. An intern is someone who is in the process of formation, and usually their goal is to one day be the minister of a congregation. It would be our responsibility to help the intern learn to be a minister. It would also be our responsibility to pay that person, though the stipend is well below what is paid to a called minister. The benefit to us, much like the benefit of having a community minister, is that we get to actively participate in supporting the broader work of Unitarian Universalism. We broaden the reach of liberal religion, while benefiting from the gifts that the individual can bring to us during their time at SNUUC. Every seminary student is required to do an internship; therefore as many congregations as possible are needed to offer them. I think we would find it fun and rewarding to become a teaching congregation, so I hope that we will consider adding that line to our budget in the not-too-distant future.

The education of ministers within Unitarian Universalism is in flux right now. You might know that we UU's have two seminaries, Starr King in Berkeley and Meadville Lombard (often referred to simply as "Meadville") in Chicago. Harvard Divinity School has a long association with Unitarianism, and throughout our history many of our ministers have been trained there, but there is no official relationship between Harvard and us. Meadville and Starr King have both faced financial challenges, and a few years ago discussed the possibility of merging. When those negotiations fell through, Meadville began looking to other seminaries with which it could partner, in order to use limited resources more efficiently. The most promising possible arrangement is with Andover Newton Theological School in Massachusetts – an irony, as ANTS was founded in 1807 specifically because conservative Christians were so upset that Harvard had become too Unitarian.

There are other changes afoot in UU theological education as well: the UUA has changed the way it is funding Meadville and Starr King, and Meadville is trying a new curriculum, emphasizing hands-on ministry throughout a student's three-year master's program.

Will all these changes result in ministers being better able to serve their congregations? That is certainly the hope. My hope is that we will be an active partner with other UU's in the formation of ministers in the future.

Sitting on the windowsill in my home office is now a tiny tree, diminutive and upright and strong, given to me by the SNUUC Board President Rosemary Olander-Beach, on behalf of the whole congregation. My hope is that you all continue to celebrate Community Ministries Sunday for many years to come, with me or without me, proud of what your congregation has done in support of Unitarian Universalist ministers serving the larger community of Metro New York and regions beyond. So often we have spoken of the Rev. Lon Ray Call's admonition for SNUUC to be a spiritual center with a widening civic circumference. That vision still thrives at SNUUC, even decades after the Rev. Call's departure. No doubt it will still thrive in the years after mine. I feel honored to be associated both with that shared vision and with you all individually.

In my last sermon, I spoke these parting words: "You yourselves are remarkable men and women whom I feel privileged to have encountered on my pilgrimage. I thank you for inviting me into your religious home. Even after I am gone far from Freeport, I know that I will continue to partake in your ministries, in much the same way that you all will continue, in some measure, to partake in mine. So I wish each of you many blessings on the journey and every travelling mercy. Wherever our paths might turn, I trust we will still have our sights set on the same bright horizon, that place where our highest human aspirations reach out and up to a spiritual dimension enlightening and encompassing us all. This I truly believe." I hope you believe it, too!

OUR BOARDWALK

It's been a busy congregational year so far. We held our first fall "program council," or Congregational Council, meeting Sept. 22. It was a chance for committee chairs and representatives to get together with me and the Rev. Catherine Torpey to talk about the year ahead. Not only was it an opportunity to exchange information, it was a forum for ideas to percolate. One idea that came out of the meeting was the "Ministry Minute," a minute during worship when a committee chair or representative takes to the chancel to talk about their group's "ministry" as an informational, and even recruiting, tool. So far we've heard from the Board of Trustees, Interweave and the Nominating Committee. Another idea we came up with, as we exchanged our experiences and dreams about SNUUC, was this fitting slogan: "SNUUC, The Friendly Congregation." What do you think?

The board has been busy gearing up for the minister's sabbatical, which is taking place from January to May 2011. At the October board meeting, the Rev. Torpey arranged for a conference call with a member of the Bridgehampton congregation, whose minister recently completed a sabbatical. It was an informative session also attended by members of the minister's Committee on Ministry. We were able to explore practical concerns, for example deciding when an "emergency" requires contacting the minister, as well as hear how the minister's sabbatical gave the congregation's members the impetus to spread their own leadership wings.

Also in October we bid farewell to the Rev. Kelly Murphy-Mason, who had been SNUUC's community minister for the past four years. The congregation is grateful to her, for the thoughtful worship services, enlightening Open Line columns, her work with the Caring Congregation program -- and really for her allowing our congregation to perform the important work of supporting the larger UU community. Both the Rev. Murphy-Mason and her ministry will be missed.

And speaking of the larger UU community: Before I run out of space I should mention SNUUC's ongoing Association Appeal, our drive to fund our commitment to the UUA and our local district associations. The Board of Trustees is leading this appeal, asking members to extend their stewardship by \$85 beyond their pledges. If we raise this money from our own pockets, we won't have to take it from the congregation's hard-earned savings. Recently a longtime member told me that years ago it was the practice of members to write a separate check monthly or periodically to cover their association dues. If you can't write that \$85 check this fall, perhaps you can give four separate post-dated checks for \$21.50. Envelopes for this appeal have been available during October; envelopes that haven't been picked up by members will be mailed out soon. Although the deadline on the Association Appeal forms is Oct. 31, the congregation will happily accept members' contributions for the Association Appeal throughout the year.

In the UU District of Metro NY, Chalice Lighters continues the centuries-old Unitarian practice of congregations supporting each other. The District Growth and Extension Committee administers the Chalice Lighters program to help UU congregations and ministries achieve their growth potential.

Twice each year, in the fall and in the spring, individuals in UU congregations are asked to contribute. Every dollar goes to the congregations or ministries selected by the District committee in a detailed grant application process. The committee selects programs that can best help make significant steps toward growth.

This Fall's Chalice Lighter Sunday at SNUUC will be November 7. This year there are three congregations participating as a group and Kelley Hausman of the Mt. Kisco UU congregation will represent the 3 congregations at our service. Proposed Changes To the By-Laws

A hearing on three proposed by laws changes is to be held on November 14, at noon in the sanctuary.

Three changes to the Congregation's by-laws are proposed for a vote of the Congregation at the next bi-annual meeting. The proposed changes would create a new "Youth Liaison" position to the Board of Trustees, and eliminate the position of a voting, youth trustee. This change is being proposed, in part, to respond to legal concerns regarding binding votes by persons who are not of majority age, as contemplated by the current by-laws. Additionally, the Board has proposed a change that would permit e-mail to be used rather than regular mail for notices to be sent to members who have provided an e-mail address to the Congregational office. Thirdly, it is proposed that language be added to the by-laws with respect to the conduct of future budget votes, in order to make clear that the budget is to be approved or disapproved at the Congregational meeting as presented (with exceptions for errors and omissions).

The proposed amendments to the by-laws will be available at the Congregational office and the SNUUC website prior to the hearing. Following the hearing, the proposed amendments - as the same may be revised as a result of the Congregational hearing - will be made available in the Congregational office as well as on the SNUUC website, no later than November 21, 2010. Comments to the proposed by-law changes to be submitted in writing, should be directed to the SNUUC office, attention of the Board of Trustees. These changes will be voted on at the bi-annual meeting on January 23, 2011.
