The Reverend Margaret H. Allen *(an itty-bitty bio)*



The Reverend Margaret Haynes Allen joined the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship at Stony Brook as Consulting Minister this past August. "Margie" (pronounced with a "hard g") grew up on the campus of Hollins University in southwest Virginia, where her father taught in the English Department. She felt the call to ministry as a teenager and majored in Greek at Bryn Mawr College with a vague intention toward seminary. But, surprise! She got a diploma in nursing

and began a 22-year career in cardiac surgery intensive care which she now considers the perfect pre-seminary prep school.

Margie graduated in 2004 from Meadville Lombard Theological School (Unitarian Universalist) and then completed two years of residency in hospital chaplaincy in Chicago hospitals. She was ordained by her internship congregation, the Unitarian Universalist Church of Annapolis (MD) in 2005 and in September 2006 began three years of service as Associate Minister with the Unitarian Church in Westport, CT.

Margie lives in south Stony Brook with her partner Linda Anderson and Linda's son, Matthew. Margie's lifelong passions include vegetable, herb and flower gardening, swimming, biking, rowing/kayaking, cooking and baking. Current interests include mindfulness Buddhism, compassionate communication, the local food movement, the enneagram, organizational development, the connection between faith and social justice and the magical little woodstove in their rented home.

Finally, the Board of Trustees will be bidding farewell to Tom Weingarten, who in addition to serving on the board, did yeoman's duty as SNUUC's treasurer. Thanks, Tom!

Please note: exceptions can sometimes be made for required rehearsals or meeting times if you chat with Catherine in advance. If you have a special talent you'd like to offer for the service itself (a song to sing, for instance), please contact Catherine immediately to see if it can be worked into the program.

1. Create mood lighting and other general set-up of space (2-4 people) – must be able to stay after worship on December 19

3. Readers (2 adults, 2 youth) – must attend meeting on Sunday December 19 at noon and dress rehearsal and arrive early on the 24th.

5. Clean up people (2-4) – must be willing to stay after the service on the 24th or come in on Christmas Day.
6. Ushering/Fire marshals (2-4) – must attend meeting Sunday December 20 and arrive early on 24th

8. Show Power Point while it is read – must attend dress rehearsal

Proposed Changes To the By-Laws

At the January 23, 2011 biannual meeting, three proposed changes to the SNUUC by laws will be presented for the vote of the Congregation. Per the by laws, notice of these proposed changes has been provided with the notice of the meeting. A hearing on the proposed changes was held earlier on November 14, 2010.

The proposed changes are (i) to make position of Youth Trustee a non-voting position on the Board of Trustees, and to exempt the Youth Trustee from the Board's deliberations concerning personnel and confidential matters; (ii) to require that a hearing be held prior to the vote on the annual budget and to clarify the use of the term "approval" in the by laws so as to confirm the budget vote is a "yes or no" vote on the annual budget as presented, and (iii) to reduce the use of paper by codifying the use of e-mail to provide notices and correspondence to members.

Text of the resolutions as well as a copy of the by laws showing the proposed changes has been posted on-line at the SNUUC website (www.snuuc.org) and is available in the SNUUC office .
