*Meet the
Rev. Alison Cornish*

A life-long Unitarian Universalist, the Rev. Alison Cornish came to the ministry quite gradually. Following her graduation from Wellesley College in Massachusetts and the University of York, UK, she pursued a career in architectural history and historic preservation. She was equally comfortable wearing a hard hat on site or advocating for preservation in community council rooms, and worked with a variety of museums, nonprofits and governmental agencies on their historic building problems.

Alison actually began her relationship with the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of the South Fork in 1989, soon after leaving her native New England. Elected President of the UUCSF Board, she had served most of her term when she made her decision to become a minister. This entailed commuting to Andover Newton Theological School, in Massachusetts, for four and a half intensive years of study and practical training. One of her last official acts as Board President was to sign, in 1999, the contract for the 2.25 acres where the UUCSF eventually built its meetinghouse. After graduation and ordination in 2004, Alison became the UUCSF's consulting minister, and was later called as the congregation's first settled minister. As well as serving the UUCSF, she continues to pursue her interest in historic buildings by providing consulting services to Partners for Sacred Places, a national nonprofit that works with congregations of all denominations and their historic buildings. Along with her co-author, Jackie Clement, Alison is the author of the new Tapestry of Faith curriculum, "Living in the Stream: Our Unitarian Universalist Story," for the UUA.

As you can see from the Stewardship Committee's report in this issue of the Open Line, the congregation has maintained its financial equilibrium in the face of some reduced pledges. This is significant. I hope you will take the time to read the committee's entire report.

The board is so grateful to the seemingly endless hours that Ellen Zaehringer-Gach and Barbara Singer devoted to this canvass drive. Their compelling "ask," their ability to help us speak honestly and deeply about money, is a true gift to the congregation.

The Finance Committee and the Board of Trustees will be working diligently in the next few weeks to formulate a budget that sustains and, we hope, grows SNUUC's programs. Please plan to attend the Budget Hearing on May 1 and the Biannual Meeting on May 22, both at noon in the sanctuary.

It's with some sadness that the board learned that our Director of Religious "Exploration," Jennifer Greene, will not be renewing her contract with SNUUC. We will miss Jennifer's energy, hard work and sunny disposition. Among Jennifer's reasons for leaving is a desire to pursue her other passions -- among them food justice -- and we're so happy that although Jennifer will formally leave SNUUC at the end of June, she'll remain close to our hearts and not such a far drive away in Bellport.

The Board of Trustees will be working with the RE Committee in the next few weeks to form a DRE Search Committee with the hope of having a new director in the fall.

And, finally, the board was so happy to learn that Carl Spatt will be honored with the June Z. Gillespie Award at the Metro District Meeting on May 7 in New Jersey. This award, which is nominated by the district board, "recognizes an individual who has encouraged congregational participation in denominational affairs and events at the district or national level. Through personal action and encouragement, this individual has developed denominational awareness and support of the denomination within his or her congregation." Carl is being honored with co-recipient Bill Slezak for hard work over the years to grow the Chalice Lighters program. We are so grateful for Carl for helping us to be our best selves in the greater UU community.

 SNUUC's 2011-2012 Annual Financial Commitment Drive
At the finish line with \$113,860 of commitments,
and awaiting a few more...
Keep rethinking "possible"!

Over the past weeks we discussed our fiscal needs and refreshed on the "Guide" and other practical concepts that help us frame our annual giving to SNUUC. We reconnected with the privilege and obligation of membership – to make a financial commitment in good faith and to keep that commitment in good standing. Most of us have made our decisions.

As of April 17, 2011 we received 73 financial commitments (pledging units) totaling \$113,860. Thank you, all.

2011-12 Financial Commitments, as of 4.17.11		<p>The results tell this story: 28 pledging units increased their pledges, six are the brand-new pledges of new members, 27 held firm and 12 reduced the amount of their gifts as compared to the current year. These 73 gifts bring SNUUC about \$6,000 more than last year for this group of pledging units.</p> <p>The increased and new pledges helped us maintain equilibrium in face of some fairly significant reductions. We demonstrated our willingness and ability to maintain a solid level of giving.</p> <p>On the other hand, our giving remains skewed to the lower absolute dollar ranges, as shown in the distribution table (similar to the current year). Unfortunately, it appears that we will not top last year's total. Our expectation is that when 100 percent of gifts are received our final number may be <u>almost</u> on par with last year's level, but we are not there yet.</p>

While we await the last few decisions, we have submitted this result to the Board. Now begins the hard work of developing our operating budget for the coming fiscal year.

This result gives us all something to think about. We celebrate the financial energy, the willingness and ability, that has achieved this collective gift to SNUUC. We acknowledge, however, that this level of giving is not enough to elevate us to the place where we can fund the desired 80 to 90 percent of our operating budget from our own pledges. Are we willing and able to strive for that in the future?

Let's keep on rethinking "possible."
