In a September sermon, I quoted an excerpt from W. H. Auden's *September 1, 1939*. He wrote the poem in reaction to the outbreak of World War II:

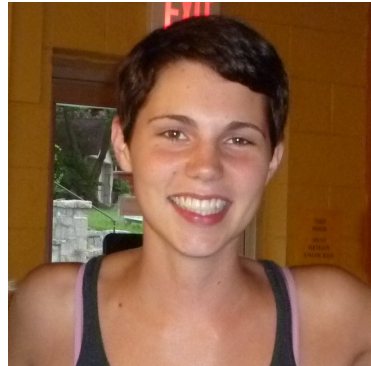
All I have is a voice
To undo the folded lie,
The romantic lie in the brain
Of the sensual man-in-the-street
And the lie of Authority
Whose buildings grope the sky:
There is no such thing as the State
And no one exists alone;
Hunger allows no choice
To the citizen or the police;
We must love one another or die.

Defenceless under the night
Our world in stupor lies;
Yet, dotted everywhere,
Ironic points of light
Flash out wherever the Just
Exchange their messages:
May I, composed like them
Of Eros and of dust,
Beleaguered by the same
Negation and despair,
Show an affirming flame.

Each Sunday, most Unitarian Universalist congregations light a flame contained in a chalice. We light that flame to remind ourselves to be "ironic points of light" in a world full of conflict, confusion and pain. I grew up in rural South Carolina as a Unitarian Universalist since I was three years old. For the second half of high school I attended a public boarding school for the arts where I studied Creative Writing and became forever connected to and in awe of the visual and performing arts. Later, I

studied history at Hamilton College in Upstate, NY, focusing mainly on Russian History. I was on the varsity Swim Team and played Rugby in college while participating in Amnesty International and volunteering at Planned Parenthood.

SNUUC Association Appeal

On Sunday, October 16, we will celebrate Association Sunday, when we recognize how valuable and meaningful it is for us to be joined with so many other Unitarian Universalist congregations around the country and around the world. For the second year, we at SNUUC are making an Association Appeal, as approved at last May's biannual meeting. For our congregation to be a member of the Unitarian Universalist Association and its local district, our congregation is assessed \$88 for each individual member. To offset this expense, we are asking each member to cover that cost with a check of \$88 per member in the household. This year, for the first time, we will be sending dues to the UUA, Metro District and LIAC only in the amounts that we raise per member. It is the hope of the Board of Trustees that we will raise the entire amount needed, so that we can count ourselves as a full- and fair-share congregation. The board will have forms and envelopes available before and after worship beginning October 9.

OUR BOARDWALK

The board is pleased that so many energetic souls have stepped up to chair and co-chair committees including Ways & Means, Art and Religious Education. These committees and others perform vital work of the congregation, but it's true that individuals can also do the work of the congregation without being on a committee.

On Sept. 26, the Rev. Catherine Torpey facilitated a new Leadership Council meeting, a gathering of committee representatives and interested members, to talk about what we want to accomplish this year and how we'll get it done.

Please speak to Catherine or a board member if you are willing and able to serve a vital function -- on a committee or otherwise. In particular, we need members to help out with membership and buildings-and-grounds work.

At its last board meeting, the trustees:

* Talked about its name-use policy, established in March and which states that committees must make clear on event publicity materials that events are sponsored by a committee and not by SNUUC.

* Adopted a social-media policy stating that: Groups and individuals who wish to establish a social media presence in the name of SNUUC must get board approval. The board plans to revisit this topic to develop a more comprehensive policy.

* Made plans to launch this year's Association Appeal, which begins Oct. 16. For our congregation to be a member of the Unitarian Universalist Association and local districts, the congregation is assessed \$88 per member. To offset this expense, we are hoping to collect an additional \$88 per member in the household. It is the hope of the Board of Trustees that we will raise the entire amount needed, so that we can count ourselves as a full- and fair-share congregation.

On a personal note, I just have to say it's wonderful to see everyone again!

Pumpkin Patch Beginning October 1st a field of orange will cover the grounds of the UU Congregation of Central Nassau at the corner of Nassau Boulevard and Stewart Avenue when pumpkins from the Navajo reservation in New Mexico will be delivered. Homemade baked goods will also be available. Close to 6,000 pumpkins in various shapes and sizes as well as some variety pumpkins, gourds, and corn are expected. Pumpkins that are grown in a dry climate tend to last longer than those grown in eastern US. You are welcome to come to take pictures, wander through and purchase a pumpkin. The pumpkin patch is open October 1st to the 31st, 11am-7pm. Admission is FREE.

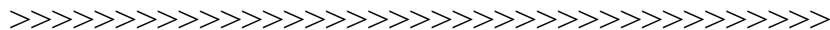
