Morning Forum

Morning Forums are off and running! Please join us - these morning sessions are a great time to connect with other SNUUC folks around issues relevant to our religious and civic life together.

Morning Forums are our weekly Adult Education class. Our ministry staff (Rev. Catherine Torpey, DRE David Silver and our Intern, Allison Palm) rotate leadership of an adult education class each Sunday morning all year. The topics follow this basic schedule: The first Sunday of each month will deal with a theme of Civic Engagement. Second Sundays are a Book of the Month, selected and announced in advance. The third Sundays are sessions of a UU curriculum called "What Moves Us." The fourth Sunday of each month will explore themes from the Bible.

The classes take place from 9 to 10am most Sunday mornings, usually in the Religious Education wing and all are welcome to come to one or all sessions. The topics are listed with the Sunday morning schedule in this newsletter on pages 1 & 2.

The January book of the Month is "Love in a Headscarf" by Shelina Janmohamed. Allison Palm will lead the discussion on January 13.

Association Appeal

As many of you know, we have begun this year's Association Appeal, a special collection of \$90 per member to fund our congregation's membership in the larger Unitarian Universalist community -- national, regional and local.

Musings from the Minister

Dear friends - It's been hard times around here since "Superstorm" Sandy - not technically a hurricane by the time it reached us, but relentless in its destruction. From the loss of electricity to the lack of gasoline, to cancellations of school or workplace disruptions, almost all of us have felt its effects. Our congregation's building escaped unscathed, but many of you have lost entire floors of your homes or businesses - sometimes both. Some of you were even in the terrifying position of being home as waters rose, wondering if you would get out without harm coming to you or your family. Many of you have been displaced into the homes of family and friends, on couches or floors, worrying that you are imposing too much on the kindness of these good people. Thankfully, I am aware of no one in the congregation who suffered any bodily harm in the storm, though some had to escape through flood waters. It has been amazing to see how many of you have opened your homes to one another, offered food, rides, and more. One member carried a disabled friend down 16 flights of stairs.

You have managed this horrible experience with remarkable grace. The resilience and generosity within our congregation is amazing. On the Sunday after the storm, our worship time was used to help you connect with each other and try to take a breath after a harrowing week. The first family to speak had lost their home, and was living with friends but needed a temporary home for their dog. The next person to raise her hand offered to take the dog, to spontaneous applause from the rest of us. There has been so much generosity and good will - it is truly heart-warming.

The holiday season always begins with Thanksgiving. I am moved by how many, despite serious losses, have said that they feel blessed: grateful for the generosity and goodwill of others, and grateful for what they have not lost: most notably, that no one has been physically hurt. Though I live in Manhattan, I had a storage unit in Freeport where all of my family memorabilia was stored and is now a wet, goopy, moldy mess. For me, this loss has prompted reflection about what really matters - what kinds of things are truly meaningful, and how very many things are more burdensome than helpful. The good that can come of such disasters is that we allow them to make us more mindful of what we are grateful for, without denying the pain of what we have lost. We will be pressured in this season to buy more stuff. How much of the stuff we lost really needs to be bought again? This holiday season, I will try to "lay up treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal." Maybe instead of replacing wet books I haven't read in years, I will spend money to be with the people I love, give food to those who hunger, and gasoline to get me to places where clean-up is still needed.

May your holidays be free of burdensome things, and filled with companionship and love.

OUR BOARDWALK



The morning after Hurricane Sandy, I like so many of my neighbors walked my property to assess what damage, if any, had been left behind. I was lucky. We had no power, but our home had not suffered any real damage. We would have to stake some Leylands in the back yard, but that was about it. At SNUUC, our linden tree suffered some, but not substantial damage. The end of a great branch is now cut as a reminder of the storm. Our building is fine. It did not flood and power came back the week of Sandy.

Many in our congregation continue to deal with the fallout from this gigantic event. Members who live near the ocean or canals suffered real material losses. They also are physically and emotionally drained. Everyone has a story, either of experiencing or witnessing loss; everyone knows someone who suffered a real hit.

It is natural to assess what has happened after a traumatic event. I'm so glad that many of our members are OK and will be all right. And I'm so proud of our minister who, accompanied by our ministerial intern, Allison Palm, worked the phone and drove where she was needed to assist others. I'm so proud of so many SNUUC members who have been active in local relief efforts. Within a week of the storm, our congregation organized a response. We have set up a Google Group to connect with post-storm relief. Members were contacted and assisted. These efforts continue.

On Sunday, November 18, we set in motion initiatives to create a response as a congregation to the broader community. Many families in Freeport are homeless. There are continuing needs in Long Beach and across the South Shore. Please let Allison Palm or Catherine know if you would like to join a group that will take on some relief effort tasks in the coming weeks in Long Beach. As winter approaches, it is appropriate we recognize how fortunate we are. And it is completely fitting with the character of our members, that we are motivated and mobilized to assist others and are grateful for the opportunity. Brian Larkin, Board President

In the RE Wing

Cultivating an attitude of gratitude was what I had in mind when I sat in with the Senior HS youth one recent Sunday. Or at least getting the youth to be mindful of the topic would have been fine. What I came away with was something very different.

I do not usually have the opportunity to spend much time teaching RE classes. But on this particular morning, I was a substitute working along with Bill Bryson-Brockmann, who has been leading this class for over a year. I started by asking the youth some general spiritual questions: Do you pray, and if you do, who do you pray to and what do you pray for? What do you think about what happens after you die? After an interesting sharing of personal beliefs, I handed everyone a clipboard with some paper and asked them to think about what it means to have gratitude and to then make a list of everything that they are grateful for. I instructed them not to limit their entries, that it could include everything from their families to their fingers.

The youth immediately started writing and I finally had to tell them to stop. Everyone went around the room sharing about 10 things that they are grateful for. There were many more items on their lists. And this was before the devastation of Hurricane Sandy. I am sure that they could add many more things to their lists today.

So it appears that the youth already understand the importance of gratitude and realize that everything is a gift. I hope your level of gratitude is high also. If you are not the grateful sort, think about this: Cultivating an attitude of gratitude has been linked to better health, less anxiety and depression, higher long term satisfaction with life and kinder behavior toward others. And more than any emotion, gratitude is the emotion of friendship.

Happy Holidays to all. I am grateful for so many things in my life, especially that I have all of you as a part of my community.
