Muusings from the Minister

Dear friends -

Did you know that there is a Unitarian Universalist congregation in Mexico? It is in the state of Guanajuato, in a beautiful colonial town called San Miguel de Allende. I wish I could say that the worship services were in Spanish and that it is filled with Mexican citizens, but in fact it is a community of US ex-pats. Nevertheless, I am excited to visit them this month, where I will preach one Sunday and assist my friend and colleague, the Rev. Heather Janules, in preaching the following Sunday. I will be interested in seeing what their relationship is with the larger Mexican community. This seems to be challenging for all UU congregations; a wise colleague recently said to me that because we don't have theology to unite us, our sociology connects us instead. The UU sense of unity, this person contends, comes from a shared culture, which often makes it difficult to reach out to other groups.

While there is certainly much truth to what this colleague was saying, I also know thatin this congregation at least, there is something much deeper and more beautiful that unites us, and that is our love and compassion for one another. This autumn was harrowing and exhausting - especially for those directly hurt by Sandy, but even for those who managed to escape mostly unscathed. And we really pulled together. I sense a shift in the congregation - an even greater appreciation for the importance of this community as a place to come when things are bad. Another colleague observed that religious congregations are what people come to when other institutions break down. Our mission is to respond to human need - period. To figure out together what the need is, and to respond with compassion and integrity.

This month marks the beginning of our annual Stewardship campaign. It has been awe-inspiring how many of you, when asked how you are doing, have spoken of how blessed you are. Indeed, we are a blessed community: we are blessed with a strong congregation which has been a home for the human spirit for sixty years. And, now more than ever, it is clear: We are all connected.

Reading as a Resolution

If you have not made a resolution for the New Year, or you have not had success adhering to the goal you had set for yourself, please consider making a resolution to read more in the New Year and share this with your children.

As parents, it is essential that we teach our children to read for wisdom and pleasure. A love of reading leads to a love of what we read about. Share with your children the books you loved as a child. Expose them to the Bible or a children's book of stories from the Bible. Even if they do not end up wanting to be immersed in biblical study, they should still want to read about what really matters in life. Family reading time is a gift for everyone.

We have been experiencing especially challenging times in the past few months, from environmental disasters to the sadness that comes from living in a broken world. Books can help us try to find meaning in it all. It is a great source of comfort and inspiration for me. And one of the many joys in my life

Let me make a few reading suggestions. If you lean toward theism, read the wonderful "The Case for God" by Karen Armstrong. If you are more of a humanist, try "Good without God" by Jeffrey Epstein. How about "The Lost Art of Compassion" by Lorne Ladner or "The Art of Happiness" by the Dalai Lama? For fiction and political satire, pick up anything by Christopher Buckley or Carl Hiassen. These are just some of my favorites.

You may also want to refer to the reading lists at the Unitarian Universalist Association website. Ask for suggestions from Catherine, Allison or a friend if you do not have current reading material in mind. Consider joining a book club.

Make a resolution to take some time away from the television, online games or other distractions and take the time to give yourself the gift of reading. It is a resolution you will be glad that you kept. And please let me know if you have a good book suggestion. I would love to know about it.

Compassionate Communication

Compassionate Communication at SNUUC

We at the South Nassau Unitarian Universalist Congregation (SNUUC) have been encouraging growth towards healthy communication through our 13-week workshop series in Compassionate Communication. In the spring and again in the fall, practice groups have formed to work with the text Nonviolent Communication -A Language of Life, 2nd ed, by Marshall Rosenberg, PhD. and to expand our learning with related interactive exercises which work to support the teachings presented within each chapter.

Arun Gandhi (grandson of Mahatma Gandhi) said that "Nonviolence means allowing the positive within you to emerge." Building on this concept, the Compassionate Communication practice group has become a vital small group ministry at SNUUC, open to all adults and youth (11th grade and up). Participants have reflected on the depth of connections made within the group as well as the potential for transformation in all their relationships as they learn to communicate compassionately and clearly with new skills and empathy.

Our next 13-session series begin on Monday, February 4th from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. for 13 Monday evenings or Saturday, February 9th from **9:45 a.m. to 11:45 a.m.** for 13 Saturday mornings. Pre-registration is requested and attendance at the first six sessions (fundamental track) is required of "newbies."
