Muusings from the Minister

As the South Nassau UU Congregation gathered under the Linden Tree for a scrumptious end-of-year picnic on June 12, families in Orlando, FL were reeling with the news that a gunman had entered a popular gay bar and sprayed the crowd with a volley of bullets that left 49 people dead and over 50 injured. As we munched down hot dogs and hamburgers and a bevy of salads and sides, families in Orlando were searching hospital lists and trying to hold onto the hope that missing loved ones were still alive.

The gunman was an angry 29-year-old son of an Afghani immigrant. He claimed that he was in sympathy with ISIS. A co-worker is quoted as saying that the gunman openly hated gays and Jews. While there are, seemingly, no direct ties to ISIS, the group claims the actions of its members and its sympathizers. (You can see it's strategically smart, if your intent is creating an atmosphere of terror.)

Reactions are mixed. Outrage, sympathy, repeated calls for gun control measures and a reiteration of the position that all Muslims should be banned from entering the country.

It's frightening to think that terrorist violence can erupt in any place at any time. And it's frightening to think that the policy of our nation and the policies of our hearts will turn to judging and treating people suspiciously because of their heritage and religion.

It goes against all that we, as a nation, and most specifically, Unitarian Universalists, hold as fundamental: the inherent worth and dignity of all people, life, liberty and justice for all, regardless of race, creed, sex, sexual orientation, nationality, religion or ethnic origin.

This violence, this vitriol is a defection of the living of our lives and the sharing of the inherent joyous bounty as human beings.

And it is my hope that what comes out of this, and other acts of violence and intolerance, is a resolve and a commitment to peace. Peace in our homes, peace in our community, peace in our state, peace in our nation, peace in our world.

My hope is that we will become ever more committed to the congregational life of SNUUC where together we find our prophetic voice, mission and purpose and make peace in the world.

Next year's overarching theme is "Getting to Yes." We'll be getting to yes by continuing to build our Religious Education Program. We'll be getting to yes by continuing to fortify our finances and getting to a balanced budget. We'll be getting to yes by developing, defining, and documenting our committee structure. We'll be getting to yes by exploring cutting-edge leadership and decision-making models of governance as we prepare for welcoming a developmental minister in the fall of 2017 and prepare ourselves for leadership in this congregation and in the community at large.

As we mourn with families in Florida and across the nation, let us resolve to appreciate the bounty and the peace at South Nassau UU Congregation. Let us strengthen our resolve to become known as agents of change and a model and a community that helps our nation and our world be one where all human life flourishes.

May it be so.

Planning for our next ministry

Since the congregation's vote at the May 15 biannual meeting to pursue a developmental minister beginning in September 2017, the board has been talking about the next steps in this process. Among the first steps is reaching out to our regional staff as well as the UUA Transitions Office to map out a timeline for the hiring of a developmental minister. This has already begun.

Because of the congregation's (tremendous!) interim work with Transition Minister Laurie Stuart, the board feels confident in having identified areas of "stuckness" that may be addressed by developmental ministry. These areas will be explored by the board to create congregational goals for developmental ministry.

In the fall, however, the board and the minister will begin to help the congregation get ready for developmental ministry. Among the long-term goals the board has identified are leadership development, diagramming how the congregation works, strengthening committees and facilitating committee information-sharing, revamping our mission, and supporting year-round stewardship.

For the short-term, the board will develop a social-media policy, ask committees to create congregational-year goals, and finalize the language for an endowment fund to become part of the bylaws.

It sounds like a lot to do – and it is! Members and friends can help by deciding what committees and other activities they will "own" in the coming congregational year. There are currently sign-up sheets for SNUUC's committee posted in the foyer. Please take some time to sign up to work on one or more committee or event.

One of the most exciting events already planned for next year is the ordination of our Transition Minister Laurie Stuart. This event is scheduled for the afternoon of Oct.ober 1. Please mark your calendars and sign up to help with this event!

In the RE Wing


