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SNUUC'S BREAKING NEW GROUND

Ministry Team Update

As the Board of Trustees began planning Breaking New Ground: A Creative, Collaborative Approach to Whole-Congregation Ministry for 2017-18, a leadership model for SNUUC in this year without a half-time minister, it created a Ministry Team to lead the congregation. The team will offer a monthly update in this space, rotating authorship among team members, to keep the congregation informed. In the first column, Rosemary Olander explained the team's mission, members and collaboration model — as well as actions and ongoing projects. In this column for November, I want to introduce myself and say more about my work and presence with you.

As many of you know, I served the UU Congregation of the Catskills in Kingston, NY, from 1992-2010. I originally went there as a Consulting Minister, then an Extension Minister, and after three years was called as the Settled Minister. Extension ministers have special training in growth and organizational development for congregations. After leaving Kingston and moving to Stony Brook where my spouse, the Rev. Margie Allen, serves the UU Fellowship there, I worked as a hospital chaplain and educator of chaplains for Catholic Health Services of Long Island. I "retired" in 2014 but continued to offer bereavement services and Death Cafes. As a community minister I am affiliated with the Stony Brook congregation. Most recently I have worked with LIAC (Long Island Area Council of Congregations) on adult programming offering workshops and organizing and leading conferences. Also, I'm on the board and active with the UU Trauma Response Ministry. I love Turkish food and chocolate.

I'm happy to be with you on two Sundays each month kicking off the theme and then closing it off in collaboration with Harriet Arnold and the Religious Education program. I'm happy to work with the board in the areas they see me as useful. My understanding of what I'm doing is to help you continue and enhance the strengths you already have here in Freeport and to collaboratively and creatively develop new ones to meet the challenges that come your way. Sometimes that will involve trainings and workshops; sometimes it will mean meeting with committees and other times it will mean consulting with leaders and even the congregation as a whole. And I'm sure needs, as-of-yet unidentified, will arise. It's all about "Breaking New Ground: A Creative, Collaborative Approach to Whole-Congregation Ministry."

I want to tell you about the service planned for Sunday, November 5. UU congregations around the country have been asked to hold another teach-in this fall by the UU White Supremacy Teach-In Planning Team: Aisha Hauser, Christina Rivera, Kenny Wiley, and religious educators, lay and ordained clergy and Unitarian Universalist Association staff. The first teach-in took place last spring and Rev Laurie Stuart led a service for you on the subject. After consulting with the Ministry Team, we've decided to answer the call and hold another service. It will focus around our UU principles, particularly our belief in interdependence, the inherent value of each person and the need for justice, equity and compassion in human relations. The service will aspire to educate, offer opportunities for each of us to look within ourselves, and with a deeper and broader understanding of ourselves and our society, inspire action and change. After the service there will be gathering circles for you to come and explore further. I hope that you will attend. We need one another.

As I write this, I see out my window leaves that are finally beginning to change colors and drop. Fall is late arriving this year. But change is coming, as I trust it will — and I want to be prepared. I have a list, as many of us do: clean out the flower beds for winter, take out the window air-conditioners, close the storm windows, maybe plant some bulbs.

And so it is at SNUUC, too, that we must prepare for change. And we have our own list. You may recall from the January biannual meeting that the Board of Trustees shared the developmental goals gleaned from nearly three years of interim ministry. The Rev. Laurie Stuart, our transition minister from 2014 through this spring, offered worship services and events to gather members' insight into our future. The board hosted forums and workshops to ask members for direction. A board subcommittee then articulated these goals in our Application for Developmental Ministry, which was shared at the January meeting.

We have goals!

Despite not having hired a developmental minister, we've called this year "Breaking New Ground: A Creative, Collaborative Approach to Whole-Congregation Ministry," intending to pursue our developmental goals. This is an excellent time to review them.

Our vision is a resilient and sustainable congregation supported by these goals:

- We want to increase our membership, participation and programming: We want growth!
- We want to deepen our congregation's connections outside our walls, inhabiting a newly articulated identity as "an everwidening sanctuary" for liberal religious expression and values on the South Shore of Long Island. This goal asks us how we want to be in the community.
- We want to continue to promote good governance, enhance healthy congregational life and achieve a clear, effective committee structure: We need improved systems and processes.
- We want to strengthen our finances to build capacity for mission and developmental goals. (Can I have an "amen!" for increased pledging and bigger fundraisers!)

Tackling the first, second and third goals, the board hosted a Joint Council gathering on Oct. 20 that was facilitated by the Rev. Linda Anderson, our lead Sunday minister and consultant to the board. Called for in our bylaws, this gathering of committee/ministry leaders and members aims to increase communication and collaboration. Nearly 20 of us shared a potluck meal and a program led by the Rev. Linda. We got to know one another a bit better, then discussed values, mission and our developmental goals as they relate to our congregational work. Some of my take-aways:

- Committees/ministries need to communicate about their happenings; especially to newcomers, communication is inclusive and inviting.
- Member relationships are the lifeblood, the "glue" of congregational life. If new members (and regular old members!) aren't engaged in "meaningful work/activities in an atmosphere of appreciative and enjoyable accomplishment," they often drift away.
- Better systems and processes can help us be more inclusive and honor the First Principle of UUism: the inherent worth and dignity of each person.
- The way to "get more volunteers" is personal! Committees/ ministries need to identify individuals who can accomplish congregational work because of their special skills or talents, tell them what the work really involves and explain why they'd be especially good at it. Then wait for them to say "yes"!

The board hopes all who attended the Joint Council gathering will take this discussion back to their committees/ministries to further our developmental goals.

Bylaws revision initiative

At a special meeting Oct. 18, the board approved bylaws changes to be voted upon at our biannual meeting in January that would primarily change trustee and Nominating Committee terms to run from July to June instead of February to January. This change brings the terms in line with our congregational year and fiscal year, and it moves the election from January to May; those now on the board and Nominating Committee would have their terms extended by six months.

Changing the trustees terms to run from July to June will improve the board's continuity and planning capacity; it also synchronizes the board with our fiscal year and the large majority of UU congregations.

The proposed bylaws changes include a bit of housekeeping: for example, correcting the number of trustees in one section to seven (as per congregational vote in 2013), and changing the address of the Unitarian Universalist Association since its move two years ago. More bylaws revision information will be provided, including dates of informational forums, in the next few days.

Join in on the *Thrift Shop Flip* at SNUUC on Sunday, Nov. 26, Thanksgiving weekend at noon in



This month in Religious Education, as we continue our study of Biblical characters from the Old and New Testament, we will look through the lens of this month's theme, ABUN-DANCE. The timing could not be better. Last month as we learned about the Old Testament; Adam and Eve, Noah, Abraham, Sarah, Hagar, Isaac, Ishmael, Joseph, and his brothers we were exploring the concept of courage. The need for courage was great as these early monotheists struggled to explain their world and people's relationships to each other and to the mystery of their existence.

Our brilliant UU children have heard the stories and as our faith suggests, they have gone far beyond the miraculous and supernatural aspects of the stories to the feelings, humanity and wisdom that undergird them. As we enter November, a month known for abundant feasting, we will also begin our look at the New Testament and the stories of Jesus and his apostles. From the people of the Old Testament, a cast of thousands, we now look at the story of one man, Jesus, and his message.

It's a great spiritual truth: We find abundance when we give ours away. Jesus put this insight at the heart of his ministry: "You must lose your life to find it." We lift it up every time we say "To give is to receive." If you are struggling with a lack of personal abundance right now, turn this truth into your spiritual exercise this month. Don't try to find encouragement; give it to others. Don't tackle your problem head on; look for others with the same struggle and find a way to offer them help. If you are feeling "poor," figure out a gift you can give. In short, address others' needs for more abundance and see what you end up with in return. *Soul Matters*
